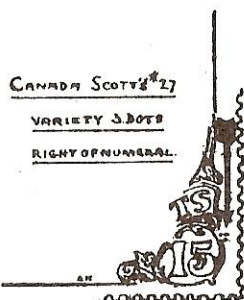
ANNUAL EXHIBITION

INTERNAL MILITIA CAMPS

Many Militia Camps used their own distinctive postmarks. During their annual summer manoeuvres these cancellers were used from 1914 to the beginning of World War II. During World War I these camps trained Canadian Soldiers for overseas duties. Several postmarks were used. The usual was a circular date-stamp, FIELD POST OFFICE, CANADA MILITIA With the name of the camp and province below. (fig 4)

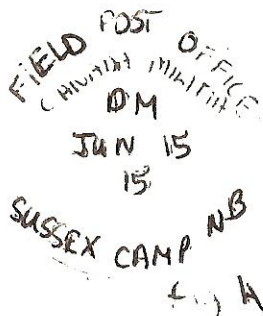
