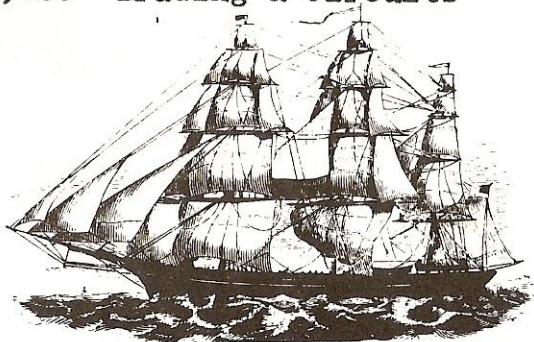

THE ANGLO-FRENCH ESSAY

The Anglo-French Essay, Circa. 1940's for the intended issue both by Great Britain and France. The design depicts H.M. King George VI, and the French Premier. A common design was to be used by both Countries, with values in both British and French currencies. This famous Essay is listed in the British Post Office Philatelic Bulletin.

CANADIAN VARIETIES

1) Royal Military

College stamps. Stamp 35 a TV antenna in the form of a faint but perceptible vertical line between the cadet's right hand and the college building.

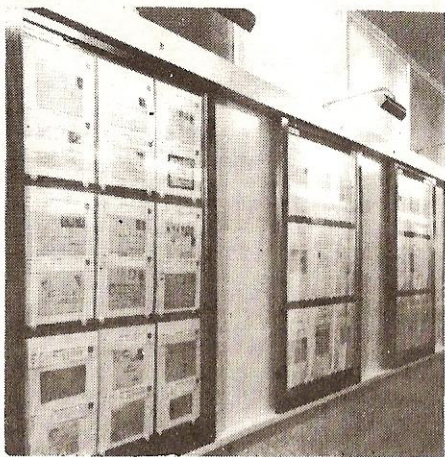
Stamp 44- "Broken Chin Strap" in the form of a short curved black line extending to the left of the cadets chin.

Two special railway parcels stamps—a Great Western Railway issue for newspaper parcels and a Great Northern Railway grain sample parcel stamp

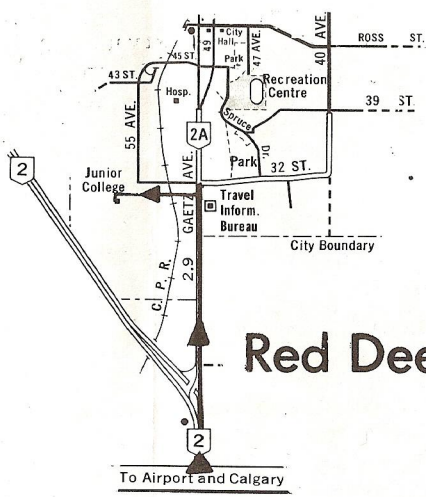

New Zealand. Looking for an unusual sideline? The N.Z. Government in 1893 entered into a contract with Miller, Truebridge & Reich whereby this firm was permitted to print advertisements on the backs of all values (1d. to 1s.) of the current stamps. These remnants of Victorian life are fascinating in themselves, and also provide a wealth of philatelic variety. There are three settings, there are various colours used and, of course, nearly every stamp in the pane bears a different advertisement, from a cure for asthma, diphtheria and croup to Irish moss for the voice!
